Unusual Circumstances Definition

On the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), you selected that you have unusual circumstances preventing you from contacting your parents or that contacting your parents would pose a risk to you.

You may be experiencing unusual circumstances if you:

- left home due to an abusive or threatening environment;
- were abandoned by or estranged from your parents
- have refugee or asylee status and are separated from your parents, or your parents are displaced in a foreign country;
- are a victim of human trafficking;
- are incarcerated, or your parents are incarcerated and contact with them would pose a risk to
- are otherwise unable to contact or locate your parents.
